

Reaching from the Atlantic coast to the limits of Anjou, the Nantes vineyards are made up of 6 appellations* with Interloire membership, covering 9,000 ha. The wines produced are exceptionally crisp and clean, and come in all three colours: red, white and rosé. Whites, however, are in the majority, and have their own special star player – muscadet, made from the melon de Bourgogne grape. Reds and rosés are produced in the coteaux-d'ancenis appellation.

2016: Fabulously fruity, deliciously fresh

The start of the melon de Bourgogne harvest for muscadet wines was officially announced on September 15th. Although the vineyards suffered at the hands of both frost and water shortages, September's ideal weather conditions resulted in very high quality grapes in an excellent state of health. In the winery, the new wines are concentrated, fresh and full of flavour. The balance in the melon de Bourgogne grapes leads us to expect a product similar to 2013, with good texture on the palate and a range of delightful, fruit-driven flavours. Gros-plant-du-pays-nantais and coteaux-d'ancenis were not quite as badly affected by the weather as other appellations, and are showing good freshness and a harmonious, balanced profile.

** Volumes of the Nantes wines will be particularly low in 2016 (270,000 hl, compared to an average of 450,000 hl) but with enough high quality reserves to supply market needs.

The anjou-Saumur VINEYARDS

With around 20 appellations* with InterLoire membership, the Anjou-Saumur region covers 18,500 ha, and enjoys the most extraordinary diversity: sweet and dry whites, fresh and soft rosés, reds to drink young or to lay down ... the list goes on.

Chenin, dry and sweet: a remarkable success

Everyone agrees that we absolutely need to stress the excellent quality of this vintage. Apart from the parcels affected by frost, chenin harvests were outstanding both in quantity and quality, thanks to the Indian summer which helped the fruit reach optimum ripeness. We are seeing a range of attractive colours and aromas, with expressive notes of citrus and white fruit.

Cabernet franc: Classic elegance

Cabernet francs ripened to perfection in the ideal conditions of an Indian summer, resulting in a very high quality harvest. Initial juices already confirm

excellent extraction with crisp fruit, good intensity and graceful elegance.

Grollean and gamay: Fruit forward

Rosé-d'anjou and rosé-de-loire made from grolleau and gamay show rich aromas of fresh fruit and colours of fuchsia and violet.

LOIRE SPARKLING WINES

Chardonnay and chenin: Beautifully balanced

September's exceptional weather conditions allowed winegrowers to take their time with the harvest, waiting until grapes had reached optimum ripeness before starting to make their base wines. Wines are fresh and balanced, with notes of citrus.



The Touraine vineyards lie in close proximity to Montsoreau, at the borders of Anjou.

They comprise 7 appellations* with Interloire membership, covering an area of 10,500 ha.

This includes some of the most famous Loire appellations such as Chinon, Saint-nicolas-de-bourgueil and Vouvray, on both sides of the river.

Concentrated sawignons with beautiful aromatic expression

It was a win/win situation this year. Healthy grapes and good weather - with a happy combination of sun and wind at harvest time - gave the sauvignons good aromatic expression and classic aromas of citrus and tropical fault

Cabernet franc and côt: Classic elegance

The cabernet francs and cots ripened to perfectior in the ideal conditions of an Indian summer. This was a high quality harvest, with initial juices already confirming excellent extraction full of supple, intense fruit and with admirable elegance. To add perspective it should be compared to certain other sectors where harvests were only half of the norm.

Gamay: Beautifully ripe

Towards the eastern side of Touraine, gamays ripened beautifully in September's fine weather. The grapes are fresh with lovely fuchsia and violet colours.
